Periodicals Archive Online offers users full-text access to the complete back files of a growing body of journals, from a wide range of publishers, all the way back to Volume 1, Issue 1. Users can search through millions of articles to immediately find the full text of important criticism and scholarship, relevant to their research.

Currently, *Periodicals Archive Online* contains over 12.5 million page-images of articles from over 500 journals – offering institutions a virtual library of journals.

The *Periodicals Archive Online* programme continues to digitise and preserve additional content in the form of major interdisciplinary collections.

Periodicals Archive Online content spans 37 key subject areas in the humanities and social sciences. Here we outline what benefits it offers in political economy and economic history.



Example research interests:

- The late-2000s financial crisis and its connections to previous crises.
- The way ideologies of globalisation and economic liberalism are expressed in high and popular culture.

***Periodicals Archive Online* serves research in this area because of its:**

Breadth of Material that Supports Interdisciplinary Study

The growth of multidisciplinary research has made the ability to interrogate a vast range of research material quickly and efficiently absolutely critical - this research project, for example, crosses economics and political history into areas such as social affairs and cultural studies. With 2.8 million articles, the breadth and scope of *Periodicals Archive Online* enables the swift identification of diverse yet relevant material.

- Searching horizontally finds instances of particular phrases, or examples of certain phenomena, across different subject areas.
- Examples can be found in a matter of seconds at the click of a button as opposed to months, or even years, spent trawling print editions of titles.

- Relevant results are returned within subject areas and publications that a researcher might not otherwise have thought to explore.
- The variety of content types, including original fiction, film reviews, and cartoons, adds colour and context to research.



A single search for instances of the term "credit crunch" returns hundreds of results across 20 subject areas, from economics, through to literature and the humanities, indicating the prevalence of the term long before the recent recession.

Depth of Material that Supports Cross-Century Research

While the range of content in *Periodicals Archive Online* is certainly to be appreciated, the depth of the back file is equally important. As well as enabling researchers to consult two centuries of key secondary scholarship, the depth of coverage is such that *Periodicals Archive Online* can function like a primary source database.

- Invaluable exploration of contemporary responses to historical events is made possible.
- Comparing events from different periods and tracing developments in ideas and theories can be achieved as easily as studying an event in isolation, giving research another dimension.
- As well as identifying contrasts in the ideology and theory of different periods, equally fascinating similarities may also be uncovered.

- Finding patterns in human behaviour and decisions can push researchers into other areas still, such as psychology and anthropology.



Consulting periodical articles of the 1920s and 1930s in *Periodicals Archive Online* emphasises how closely the discourse and analysis of the Great Depression mirror those of the late-2000s recession. Even shortly before the Wall Street Crash, many economists were still calling for greater decentralisation and deregulation of the financial sector, whereas, by the 1930s, an excess of credit and irresponsible lending was being blamed for the crisis.

Post-Search Capabilities that Support the Research Process

Keeping track of all material consulted and research paths explored during the course of a research project can be time consuming but the post-search tools available in *Periodicals Archive Online* can assist in many ways:

- Users have the ability to focus lists of results by filtering them according to a set of live-updated criteria based on a summary of their search.
- Users can keep track of selected records during their session using the *Marked List*.
- The personalised *MyArchive* feature enables users to store records and save useful searches.
- Bibliographic records can be directly downloaded into the most common citation management tools or saved in a suitable format for transfer by users into their bibliographies.



The availability of *Periodicals Archive Online* can transform the way in which economic history is taught:

Encourage Exploration

It has traditionally been difficult to persuade undergraduates to consult material beyond relatively homogeneous secondary sources but with *Periodicals Archive Online*, lecturers can encourage users to explore contemporary historical material alongside modern scholarly analysis. In this way, students may be asked to consider not only the historical context, but also, for example, the differences between particular publications.

Diversify Sources

The range of publication types in *Periodicals Archive Online*, from traditional scholarly titles, through to major publications that were not originally scholarly in nature, but have become key resources for researchers, makes explorative work particularly effective. Lecturers can direct students to *Periodicals Archive Online* to explore the way reactions to the same events differ:

- In journals offering academic analysis, such as *Social Research*.
- In trade titles like *Management Review*.
- In those offering more popular commentary and reporting, such as *The Spectator*.

Support Independent Research

As well as making the building of course packs and reading lists easier, the easy access to such a variety of material allows students to identify content themselves – teaching therefore no longer has to be so prescriptive in setting texts for analysis.
