The oldest continuously published daily black newspaper in the U.S., *The Philadelphia Tribune* was founded by Christopher James Perry. His paper conveyed ideas and opinions about local and national issues affecting blacks in the post-emancipation period, and today continues to serve the country's fourth-largest African-American community.

The Philadelphia Tribune campaigned to appoint black citizens to the board of education, city council, and judiciary. It actively supported the growth of the United Way fund and launched a "clean block" program, promoting the health, safety, and well-being of the city's residents. The newspaper fought against segregation and rallied against the race riots in Chester, Pennsylvania.

Searches can be confined to specific article types and dates to focus on the most relevant information. Each newspaper page is zoned into article images, and each newspaper image is supported with searchable ASCII text. Combined, these features mean faster, more effective searches for users. ProQuest digitizes documents at a high resolution to deliver clean, readable images, and highlights search terms to focus readers on the most relevant content.

Researchers can sort their results by oldest, most recent, or most relevant. In addition, stories that originally spanned multiple pages of a newspaper are “threaded” together, appearing as one continuous image and improving readability. Users can view and easily download articles, front pages, photos, display ads, and more in PDF format. The “My Research” summary feature can be used to track recent searches, save articles, email documents, create a bibliography, export citations, and create Web pages.
